The Seriously Strange Report

The first thing about Seriously Strange that has to be commented on is the management of this truly excellent event. As a professional management consultant and Fellow of the



Chartered Management Institute, myself, I could very happily use Seriously Strange as a model of how planning and management at its best can produce a superb event. I was only sorry that we couldn't stay for everything, but by one of life's little ironies, I am also President of Jumbo GB, the bikers' charity that helps children with special needs, together with their parents and carers and ASSAP's 30th Anniversary fell on the same week-end as Jumbo's 50th. Seriously Strange is an event on a totally new scale for ASSAP, and was a fitting celebration of 30 years of this organisation. With 275 booked onto the conference, making it the biggest event of its kind for a very long time, 20 top speakers and 135 people attending the Gala Dinner celebration, Seriously Strange was a testament to what a small group of determined people can achieve. The ASSAP Board of



Directors really did us proud. But such a summary ignores the role ASSAP as a draw had. Amazingly we drew our speakers from amongst our membership. We were able to provide this event free to members because of the generosity of those speakers and their goodwill toward ASSAP, and the University of Bath's flexibility because of ASSAP's charity status. The following pages will give a flavour of the event for those many members who could not make the conference.

Seriously Strange really is a milestone in ASSAP's history, and not just because of the Big Announcement. Not only was the scale of the event something to be proud of. But the quality of speakers was very high, drawing delegates from as far away as Orkney, the Middle East and India. Seriously Strange also led half our membership to join our new Direct Direct scheme - which is very important for our future success - but also saw our membership increase by 50%. The scale of this membership increase also has knock-on effects; the most obvious of which was the economies of scale needed to make ASSAP's re-branded magazine full colour for the first time.

Generous donors on the day put us two-thirds of the way towards our goal of a new £2000 per year research grant pot.

Ultimately ASSAP is driven by people. More people are now interested in ASSAP research than perhaps ever before. The re-branded training weekend, "Seriously Investigating", even sold out within 24 hours!

We can be sure knowing ASSAP is now well set for its next 30 years.

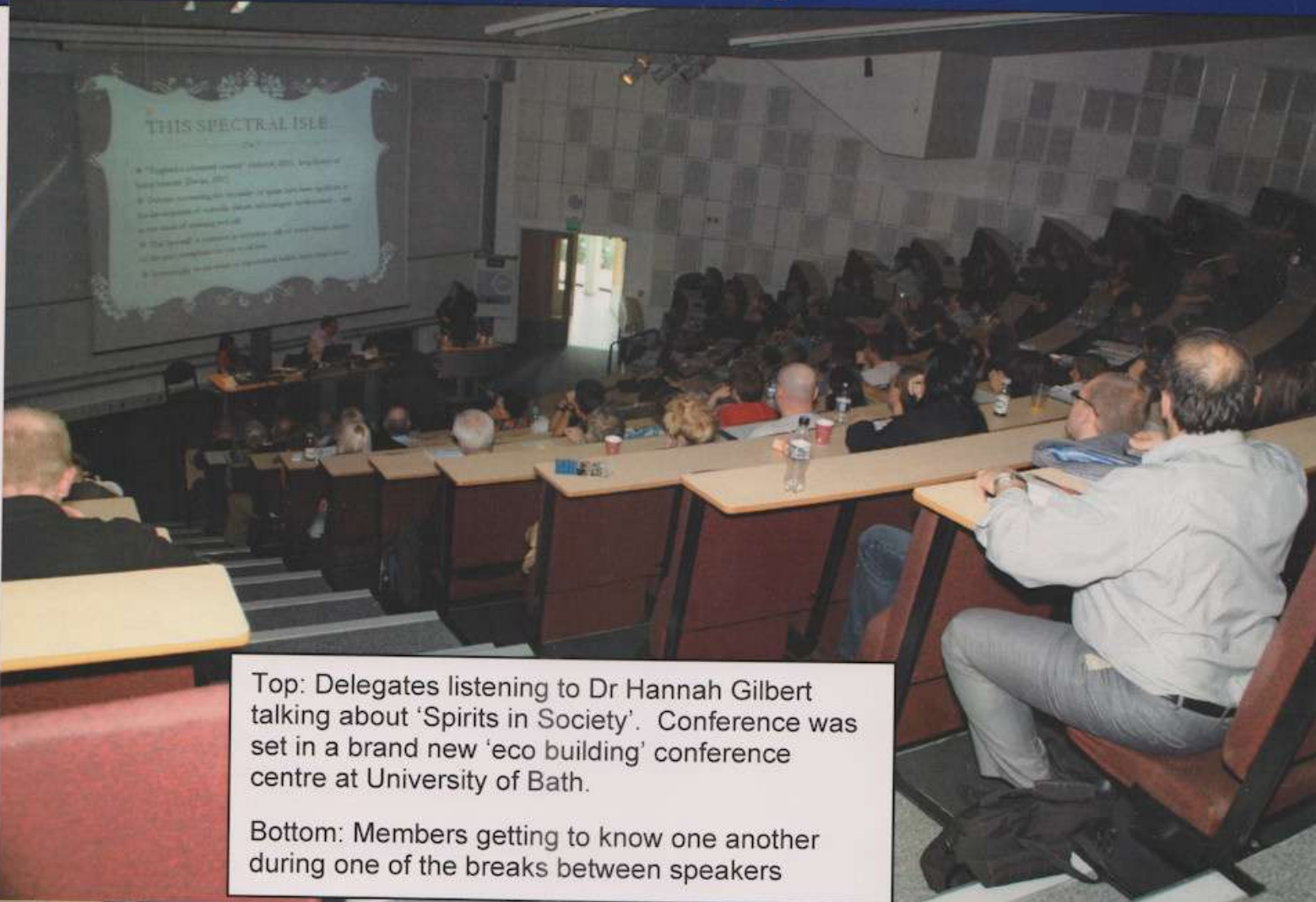

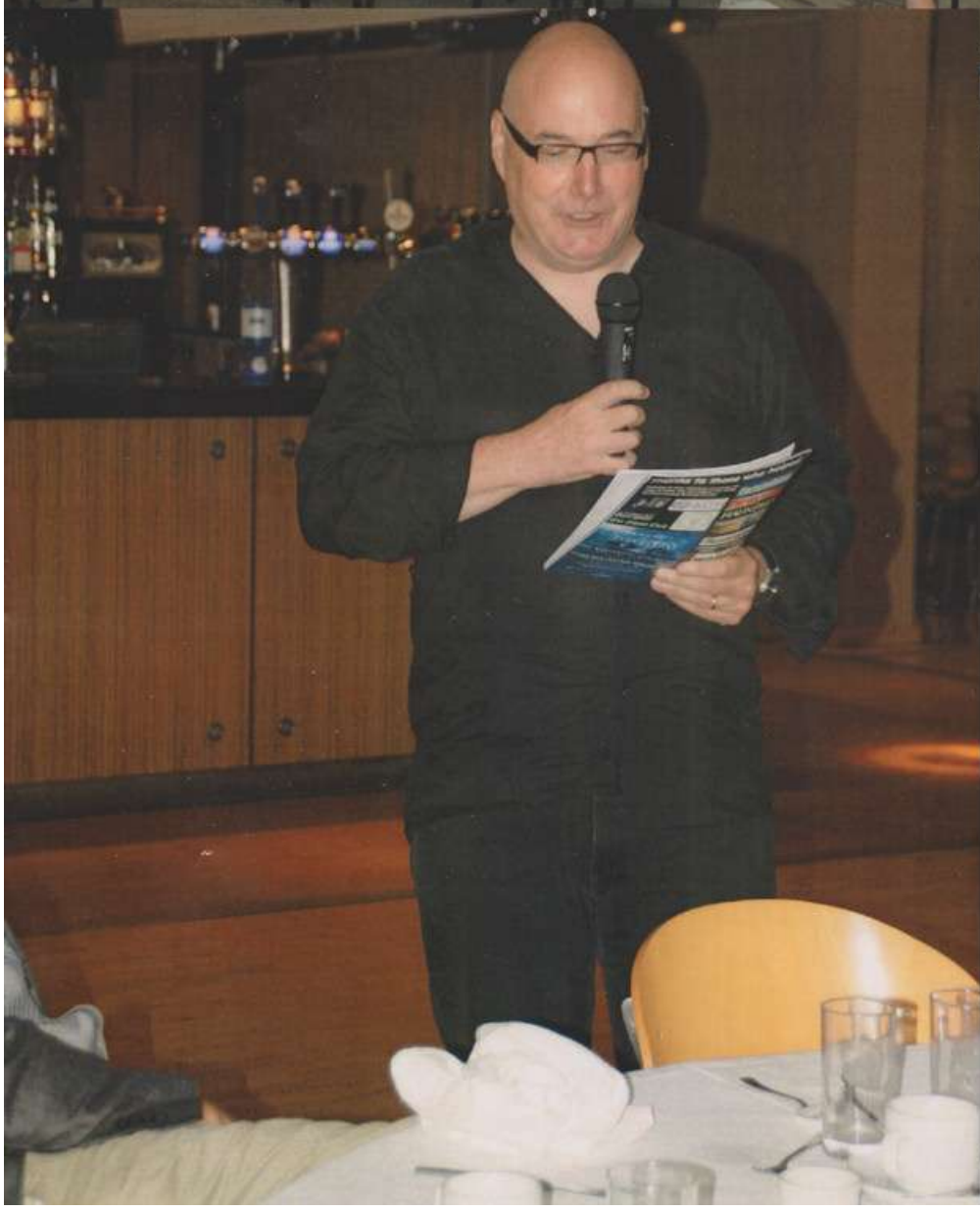
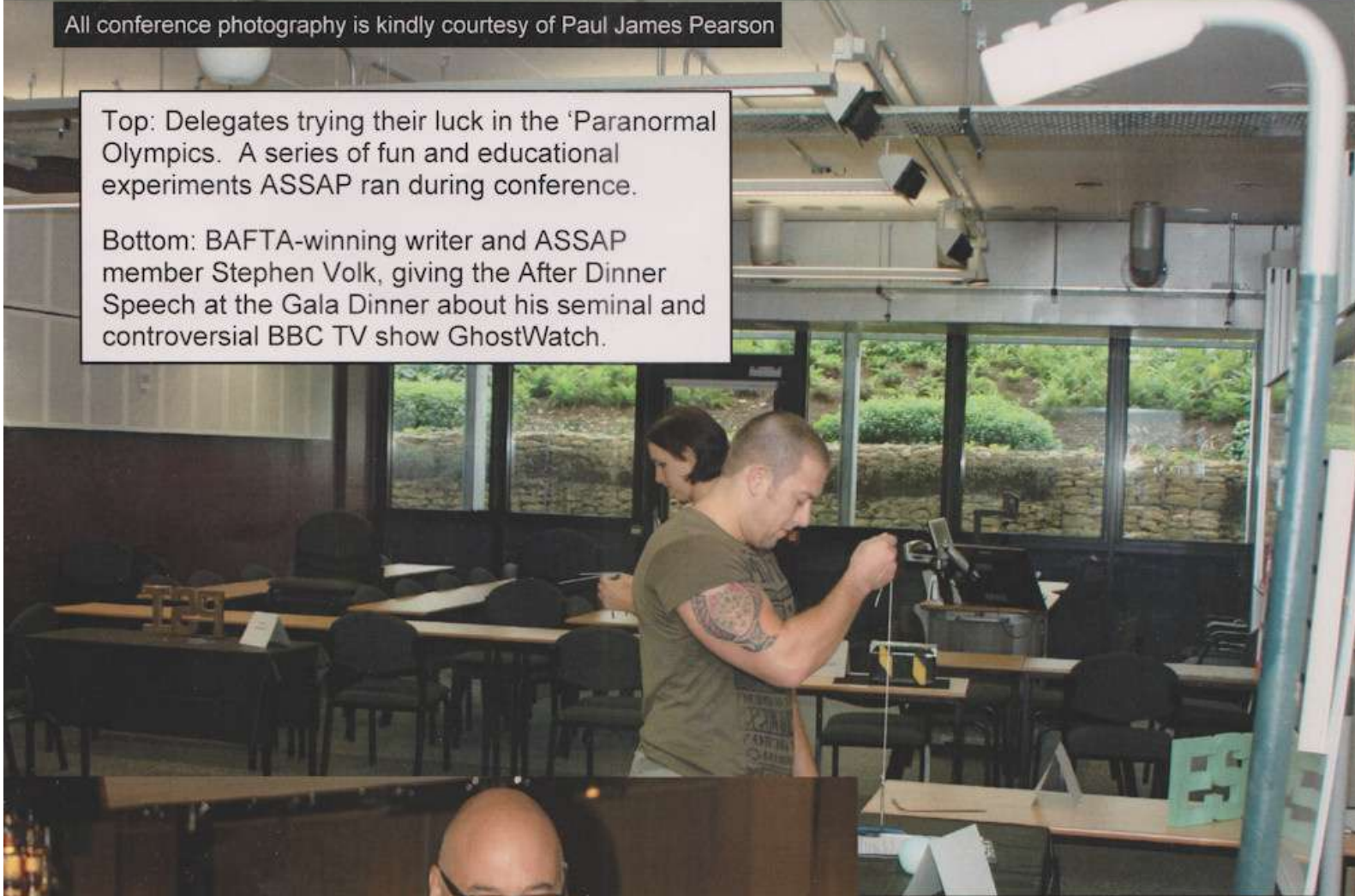

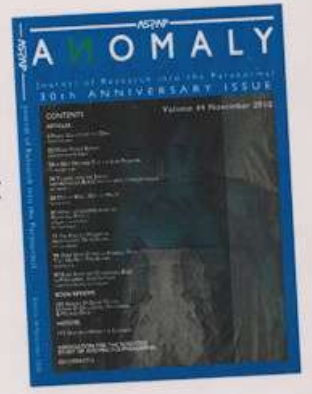

The next edition of *Anomaly: Journal of Research into the Paranormal* will act as a record of the Seriously Strange conference.



ASSAP the Professional Body

Share your views in the consultation

During Seriously Strange, on 10th September 2011, ASSAP discussed the 'big announcement'. The announcement was that ASSAP has been registered with the UK government as a Professional Body for investigators of anomalous phenomena.

This puts ASSAP in the unique position of being the only professional body for investigators. There are other professional bodies for parapsychologists and psychical researchers for example the Parapsychological Association.

The government does not register organisations that *intend* to be professional bodies but recognise bodies that *already* act as professional bodies. ASSAP already meets the government criteria of a professional body and, as such, as been acting as a professional body in all but name until the time of application.

This formal recognition has potentially huge implications for ASSAP and is good news for the field as a whole.

ASSAP, as ever, is keen not to present a 'finished product' but wants to hear the views of members and non-members of ASSAP alike before considering the wide implications.

The announcement was met with some controversy and misunderstanding, as some thought this meant a 'hostile

takeover' of the paranormal community. This is definitively not the case.

Members of ASSAP also would have to 'opt in' to any form of 'professional membership' category of ASSAP membership.

Big initial questions would include the role of trained and Approved ASSAP Investigators within this set-up, as well as the place of ASSAP Affiliate Groups. AAls and Groups are

especially welcome to input into this process.

Oxford University Grant

Over summer ASSAP awarded a research grant to Oxford University for a study into 'mirror gazing'.

The study, involving fifty-two participants, saw individuals 'mirror gazing' and recording visual disturbance. Participants were primed with a task containing words of a religious context to compare differences in experience compared to a control group.

The full results of the study will be published in the 2011 edition of ASSAP's journal *Anomaly* and will also be presented elsewhere.

Rename ASSAP's Rebranded Full Colour Magazine

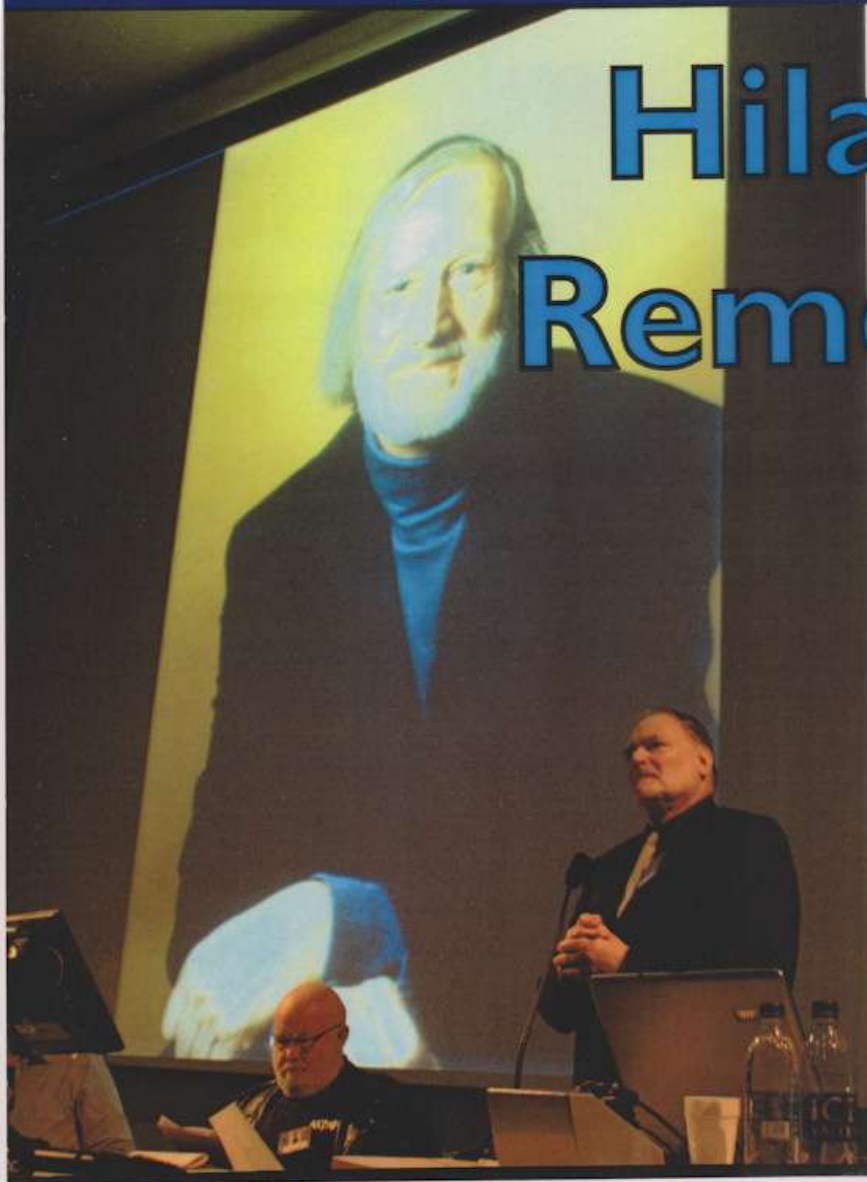

ASSAP Members Increase by 50% in 3 Months

Through the recession ASSAP has bucked the trend of mass-membership organisations which have mostly found their membership numbers profoundly decreasing. ASSAP was not immune the the recession, having to say goodbye to a number of members. However due to the team's active outreach work at conferences there was a steady increase in net membership over the last three years.

A massive increase was seen in the three month period leading up to Seriously Strange, which saw a large surge of interest in ASSAP. Our overall membership increased by a staggering 50% over this period!



Hilary Evans Remembered

1929-2011

Lander in 1956, who predeceased him last year. They had one daughter, Valentine.

From 1953 to 1965 he worked as a copywriter with the Mather and Crowther advertising agency, engaged with campaigns for such glamorous organisations as *Allied Ironfounders Ltd*, the *British Industries Fair* and *Imperial Typewriters*. He was also with the London Press Exchange.

Hilary was both the spirit and guiding hand behind ASSAP's formation in a very real sense. He and I were on the Council of the Society for Psychical Research (SPR) in the mid-1970s and during a visit to the formidable Dr Dingwall he shared his belief that the way forward in Anomaly Studies (Hilary arguably coined this phrase) lay via an "umbrella organisation" which crossed subject boundaries. Many researchers were carrying out excellent work in their respective fields, for example psi research and ufology, but he felt they were missing the possibility of explanation by not comparing and contrasting various anomalous experiences elsewhere.

The opportunity came possibly sooner than many of us expected. Hilary offered his media expertise freely to the SPR's Publications Committee, which had the bright idea of producing a range of small booklets that - as part of a membership drive - could serve as an introduction to the field of study for people new to the subject, with references to literature for further reading. This totally laudable venture went horribly wrong when the cost of printing four or five booklets at a printer chosen for high-quality

ASSAP Vice-President Dr Hugh Pincott looks back on the life of Hilary Evans, one of ASSAP's most influential founders who died on 27 July, aged 82, ahead of a full obituary in the 2011 edition of *Anomaly*.

A book entitled *Harlots, Whores and Hookers: A History of Prostitution* does not rest easily beside *The WI Creative Guide to Cross-Stitch*. Nor *Visions, Apparitions, Alien Visitors: a Comparative Study of the Entity Enigma* beside *The Picture Researcher's Handbook*. Yet this was the breadth of scholarship demonstrated by one of the most intuitive paranormal researchers, analysts and commentators of the past century.

Hilary Evans was born in Shrewsbury in 1929, a vicar's son, spending early years with his parents in India. He read literature at Kings College, Cambridge and then at Birmingham, teaching for a few years afterwards. Hilary had two younger brothers and an adopted sister. He married Mary

turned out to be some four times what Council had budgeted, though sales over a period might have recouped much of this. Great objection was raised even to the books' "garish" covers, though they looked plain enough and even attractive to many.

Frankly, this was no big deal in itself, but it afforded a convenient opportunity for many of the "old guard" - plus academics with vested interests and fear of "popularising" - to halt the advance of the so-called "modernisers" whose achievements had made them uneasy for some time. So Hilary, David Christie-Murray and I - considered as such - were thrown off Council, and within months, ASSAP was founded. Yes, I may have fired some shots but Hilary loaded the gun.

An almost compulsive author, Hilary wrote or edited some 35 books and illustrated 15 others. Twelve volumes related to paranormal and related anomalous experiences, most of which have become required reading - classics, even.

Many seminal works on the UFO phenomenon were written jointly with other expert researchers, and ASSAP published an intriguing slim volume concerning *The SLI Effect* (Street Lamp Interference). He was a leading proponent of UFO phenomena as culturally-shaped visionary experiences. He once told me they were a more important study than hauntings. Hilary believed that understanding extraordinary phenomena required understanding the person who experienced them. Also, investigating the common psychological processes behind varying phenomena, studying them together rather than in isolation.

All Hilary's publications were well researched and referenced, academically rigorous, but above all, immensely readable. His interest also extended to Cryptozoology and other Fortean Phenomena. Even-handed as ever, he assisted the fledgeling *Skeptic* magazine with suitable pictures.

Thousands of pounds of royalties were earned for ASSAP with the launch of *The Evidence For ...* series: nine volumes written by respected researchers in topics as diverse as *Phantom Hitch-Hikers* and *Alien Abductions* to *Mind Over Matter* and *The Bermuda Triangle*.

Hilary Evans Remembered

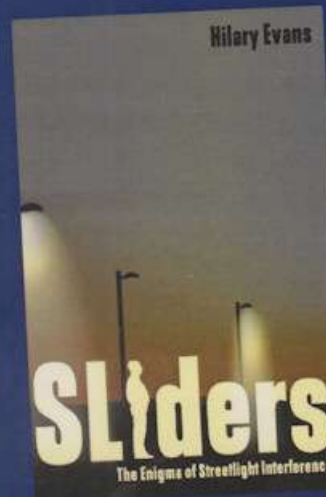
ASSAP member **Dr David Clarke**, senior lecturer in journalism at Sheffield Hallam University and an authority on folklore, regarded him as a real gentleman and a friend. "Hilary was a towering intellectual presence in a field bedevilled by sensationalism and controversy. The loss of his moderating influence will leave a void that cannot easily be filled."

ASSAP Life Member **Lionel Beer**, President of the British UFO Research Association (BUFORA), remembers that Hilary was one of the "good guys". "There were precious few who were willing to share information and debate the issues without acrimony and self-interest."

Bob Rickard, the first editor of *Fortean Times*, and a leading founder-member of ASSAP recalls: "I remember being deeply impressed by Hilary's interest in and knowledge of Fortean Phenomena, cryptozoology and particularly ufology. There is no doubt his immense breadth of scholarship helped set the high tone of ASSAP's aspirations, and from which it has benefitted since. A loss of this magnitude will be very hard to bear."

His obituary in *The Guardian* read, "The range of his scholarship through time and across phenomena meant he was able to see connections no one else could."

The Daily Telegraph also commented, "...cool prose elevated Evans above the pack in his many books on such subjects. Usually he concluded that the key to explaining mysterious events lay with the person undergoing those events, rather than with some outside force."



Hilary was a generous friend to ASSAP.

Not only did his 'Evidence for...' series of books benefit ASSAP in its earlier days, he pledged the proceeds of his last book - *SLiders, The Enigma of Street Light Interference* (2010) - to ASSAP.

Update from Parasearch

Education, Education, Education

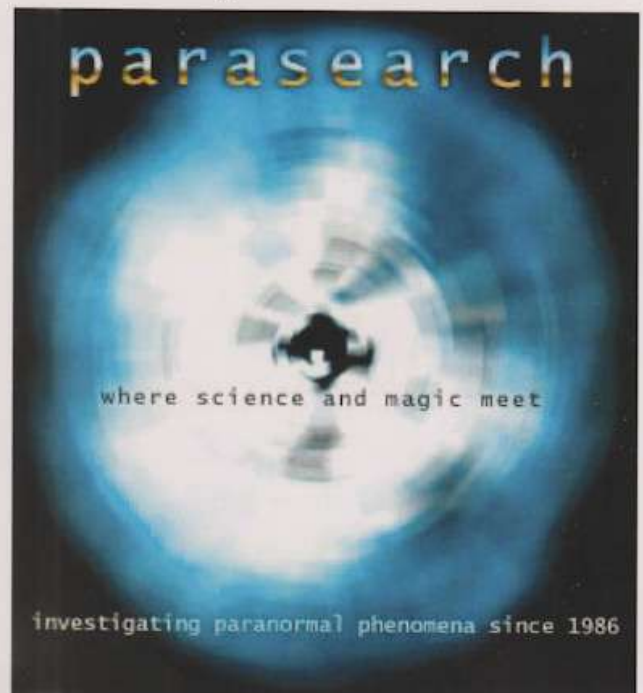
Midlands based ASSAP regional group Parasearch have always believed that education plays an important part in what they do, which is why they have always engaged with local schools and charities and organisations such as the National Trust to get over their message of research and the scientific method.

They have recently provided educational assistance for Sandwell Councils Museum & Heritage Services, not only by running historic guided tours with a paranormal theme, but they have recently produced information display boards and leaflets on specific buildings

haunted heritage.

Continuing the theme of education, Parasearch have also assisted with a local history forum who have been awarded a lottery grant to produce educational DVD's. Parasearch have been able to assist with several of these by supplying information on the local folklore record and contemporary anomalous experiences. They have also assisted with historic guided tours and the production of an

educational leaflet. In return they have access to a rich seam of regional vernacular material which will be vital to their ongoing discourse analysis of local anomalous reports.



Project Albion

Parasearch has begun the first phase of its Project Albion research. Under the banner of 'The Ghost Map Project' Parasearch is examining in detail a specific geographical area around Worcestershire. So far Parasearch have

collected a unique archive of witness reports and these are being compared against local historical, archaeological and geological records, with some very interesting results! This project will also allow Parasearch

investigators to build up a unique archive of oral witness testimony. Details of these will be published in a short article in a future issue of ASSAP News.

What makes venue owners tick? Anonymous interview
